REFLECTIONS ON ST. NICHOLAS

For a few years now, I have been asked to wear my vestments on a special day near to the day when the church calendar remembers St. Nicholas (December 6th). Nicholas was a bishop in the church in the fourth century, who became very popular for his generosity to the poor, and for his protection of sailors when their ship was in peril.

My appointed task this year was simply to sit, robed in cope and mitre in the Common Room off Steacy Hall, and give the children a small bag of gifts while Patricia read a few stories from a book about St. Nicholas. Some wit in England once described the work of a bishop this way: "A bishop is, generally speaking, generally speaking." In this case I was the exception to that rule. My task was to be a welcoming presence while allowing children to see a bishop's vestments when the bishop is dressed to lead worship.



There is a problem in using today's customs for displaying what a bishop would normally

wear in the fourth century. Like clothing in the secular world, church vesture changes over the years. A fourth century bishop probably wore a white long garment, as most Roman gentlemen did in those days, along with something like a poncho over the garment.

That was it. It was the usual clothing for Sunday worship that other churchmen would wear as well. As that fashion changed for most men, the clergy kept to the older fashion. Many generations passed, and the clergy added some items that were more particular to their role – a stole around their shoulders, and the bishop's hat that was worn as a statement of their office in the church. The mitre did not become common until around the first millennium of the church's life.

An incident happened towards the end of the time of gift-giving on Sunday. I saw Michael (a retired bishop) with his granddaughter who was obviously apprehensive about entering the room. (Michael was dressed much the same as all the other men at the coffee hour.) He spoke gently to the young girl and then took her hand and led her to join the other children. I was able then to give her the little bag of gifts. It occurred to me later that Michael's gentle way with the girl, his own self-effacing manner with her, and even the way he was dressed, said more about St. Nicholas to those who could see than the modern episcopal vesture could ever do.



SYNOD 2022

Synod takes an important step towards "leading change"

In October, seven members of All Saints' Westboro gathered with other representatives from the Anglican Diocese of Ottawa for the first in-person Diocesan Synod since 2019. It was wonderful to be together after two years of online meetings.

This Synod was especially important because it marked the culmination of many months of discussion, meetings and prayerful reflection around the Shape of Parish Ministry Consultation (SPMC). Since the beginning of the consultation process, Bishop Shane urged us to step away from *being* changed to instead *leading* change. "We want to be part of a church that is thriving," he said.



At Synod there was a commitment to do just that as we collectively voted in favour of three motions to strengthen our diocese for the future, nurture parish ministry and engage with the world.

Our Primate, Archbishop Linda Nicholls, attended the two-day meeting and offered her own reflections on our decisions, reminding us that God is not afraid to take risks and experience change.

We also heard from youth delegates, including All Saints' own Deborah, who delivered a thought-provoking and moving message, urging us to be welcoming to all and to try new

things, saying "we are not just the house of God we are the home of God."

Finally, we heard about the many community ministries operated by the Diocese, including one in Cornwall called Centre 105 which offers daily breakfasts to the community. In addition to food and fellowship, Centre 105 also offers weekly visits from a public health nurse and even visits from a mobile library. It was recently voted the best non-profit in Cornwall. As a sign of the difficult times many are experiencing this year, the number of clients has grown significantly in 2022.

There is much work still to be done to fulfill the vision of the Shape of Parish Ministry, but we left Synod with optimism and goodwill for the journey ahead.
