

All Saints' Tree of Faith

A shoot will come up from the stump of Jesse; from his roots a Branch will bear fruit. The Spirit of the LORD will rest on him— the Spirit of wisdom and of understanding, the Spirit of counsel and of might, the Spirit of the knowledge and fear of the LORD— and he will delight in the fear of the LORD. (Isaiah 11: 1-3)

The Jesse Tree is a way of telling the story of God's plan from the beginning of time to redeem His people by sending a Saviour. It follows the lineage of Christ's family and key people in the Old Testament that God uses to tell His story from Creation through Christ's birth. It is a countdown daily to Christmas with the telling of a story, and an ornament that acts as a symbol and visual reminder of the story.

Our church school children will be decorating and collecting smaller versions of the ornament to create a Jesse Tree at home. We hope to provide story-reading of each ornament's Bible story for our children to check out as they decorate and celebrate along with us.

The Jesse Tree in Steacy Hall are full of ornaments already and there is still lots of room to add your faith stories to create our shared narrative as a faith community. You can receive a small paper plate from the Parish Office to put to it your symbols that represent your faith story or a photo of your family. We hope that by Christmas Eve, we will have a tree filled blossoms!

Message for Advent



Each year, in following the lectionary, we read from a different gospel. During the past year we have been reading from the gospel of Matthew. Starting on December 3, we began to read from the gospel of Mark. Although it comes second in the New Testament, Mark was the earliest gospel to be written. Matthew and Luke in fact draw heavily on Mark for their own gospels. About 90% of Mark's gospel is also in Matthew. Mark wrote his gospel for both Jews and Gentiles, probably a community in northern Galilee or Syria; often he takes time to explain some Jewish customs to gentile Christians. It is thought that the gospel was written around the time of the Jewish revolt against Rome, around 70 C.E. (Paul's epistles are the earliest books of the New

Testament, written some 20 years earlier, around 50 C.E.)

Mark is the shortest of the gospels. It might be useful to read it through at one sitting (about 2 hours) to get a sense of the sweep of the story. More than half of the gospel is the story of the last week of Jesus' life.

The gospel does not begin with the birth narratives but tells the story of Jesus' ministry beginning with his baptism by John and the call of the disciples. In the Christmas season, then. we will read the birth stories from Matthew and Luke. In Mark's gospel, the story is told with urgency. Mark frequently uses the

phrase, "and immediately" or "at once." The time is short to get Jesus' message across. This gospel does not have long passages of teaching, or many parables, but recounts events in Jesus' life especially his final journey to Jerusalem. Mark does not show Jesus as proclaiming his identity as Messiah openly. Frequently Mark reports that Jesus told the disciples not to tell anyone about miracles they had seen. Mark does not have any stories of the risen Christ, but ends abruptly with the empty tomb.
